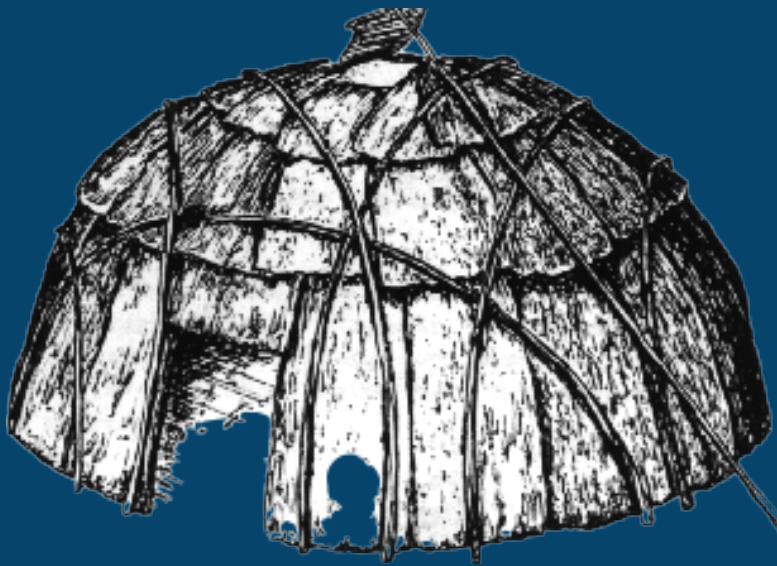
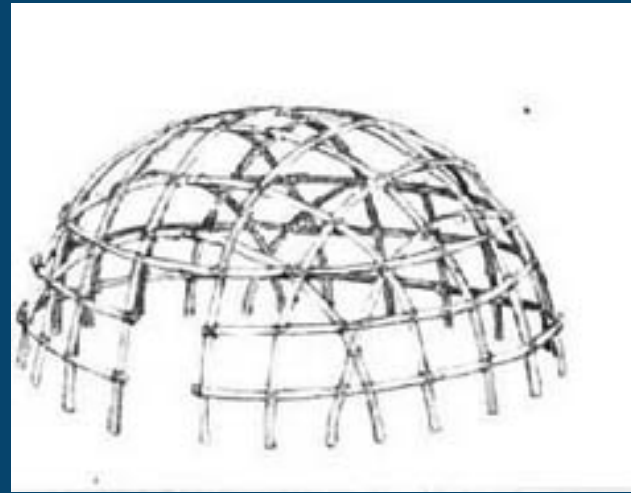


NO PLACE LIKE HOME

WIGWAMS WERE THE TRADITIONAL HOMES OF THE EASTERN WOODLAND INDIANS. BUILT BY SINKING CUT SAPLINGS IN A CIRCLE OF HOLES IN THE GROUND AND LASHING THEM TOGETHER WITH SINEW, WIGWAMS WERE COVERED WITH SHEETS OF BIRCHBARK, ANIMAL HIDE, AND REED MATS.



TAKE A WALK ALONG THE UPLAND WALK TO SEE THE ARBORETUM'S MODEL WIGWAMS. GATHER SMALL STICKS FROM THE FOREST FLOOR TO BUILD A MINIATURE WIGWAM ALONG THE PATH.
